EDITOR'S NOTE

Welcome to Eurovision 2023, or, as I like to call it, The Most Wonderful Time of the Year!

Eurovision isn't just a night. It's actually the culmination of months of activity. I've spent my Saturday nights juggling multiple devices, trying to watch simultaneous broadcasts of song competitions in languages that I don't understand. I've listened to hundreds of songs, discovered some fantastic new artists, and have travelled to multiple countries to watch these acts perform.

I know that I'm biased, but this year's Eurovision is a bumper crop of goodness. Even the most hardened Euroskeptic will find something to love among this year's 37 entries.

That's because Eurofans are notoriously bad about predictions. Our inside knowledge is so deep that we often forget that people are going to be experiencing these acts for the first time this week. The decisions people make will be based largely on their first encounter of a three minute performance, and how that makes them feel. I can only hope that you love my favourites as much as I do. (Watching some of the rehearsal previews, I fear that the staging may make that difficult for some songs!)

However, taste is subjective, and you, dear reader, may end up loving what I hate, and vice versa. I hope you have fun watching the show and commenting on the acts. But as we enter the week, a quick plea from me: Don't be a dick on social media.

SEMIFINAL ONE

Semifinal One will air on Tuesday, May 9.

In addition to the acts, there will be entertainment from:

- Julia Sanina, the lead singer of the Ukrainian band the Hardkiss
- Alyosha, who represented Ukraine in the 2010 contest, performing with British singer Rebecca Ferguson, and
- Rita Ora, who almost represented the United Kingdom at the 2009 contest, but dropped out of the running. She missed the chance to sit on stage with Andrew Lloyd Webber! (Jade Ewen was the eventual 2009 representative and placed 5th with the song 'It's My Time.'

Ten of the fifteen entries performing this evening will qualify to perform in Saturday's Grand Final. All entries will be chosen by televote only; no jury scores will be given.

The UK **cannot** vote in this semifinal. However, the Rest of World can, so please ask your friends in non-Eurovision competing countries to vote on your behalf.

Take your pee break at song 8.

This whole semifinal is fairly high-energy, with only two ballads in the entire lineup, so pace yourselves accordingly. Don't wear yourselves out on the first few dance tracks, because some bangers are coming at the very end!

Here's the running order guide to what you can expect from each song tonight:

NORWAY

Who they are: An Italian-Norwegian powerhouse vocalist who has a big whistle note moment

What it's about: She, the conqueror of the North and Southern Seas

The song: A high-energy electroshanty that fits into the tradition of Scandi fantasy songs; could be nightcore if it was just a little more uptempo

Fun fact to sound like an expert: Artists can't use autotune at Eurovision, but the Norwegian national final - in a very risky move - allowed it in their competition

Jokes that have already been made: "My pronouns are she/queen of the kings"

The verdict: It's a crowd-pleasing banger that is going to make the arena pop off, but there's drama as to whether Alessandra will hit that whistle note

Best National Final reject: Tresko, a song about getting drunk in clogs

Who they are: A meme-aware, TikTok friendly three piece boy band

What it's about: Introverts partying at home.

The song: A catchy bop for the first minute. Which is identical to the second minute. And getting wearisome in the third minute.

Fun fact to sound like an expert: The sweater in question? Now sold out on ASOS! (I've seen it on at least one person in Liverpool)

Jokes that have already been made: Epic Sax Guy comparisons (Another fun fact - Epic Sax Guy was once again in the running to be Moldova's entry this year)

'Mild Youth.' Seriously, this band got a lot of flack from TERFs in what is a long story, so please show them some love, no matter how generic their song is

Everyone will be tweeting "Is this Sixpence None the Richer" or "Is this the Lightning Seeds"

The verdict: I personally love this song, but it may struggled to stand out in a night of spectacle. A lot will depend on whether they can nail the vocal harmonies.

Best National Final reject: n/a

Who they are: A pan-Slavic girl group

What it's about: Oooh, this is controversial - ostensibly, feminism; really, Ukraine.

The song: It's... a lot. A group of women doing white voice adjacent folk singing is usually my catnip, but this just seems a bit messy.

Fun fact to sound like an expert: The song is performed in Czech, Bulgarian, English, and (controversially) Ukrainian

Jokes that have already been made: I haven't seen a single joke about Vesna, largely because everyone's been talking about the concept of pan-Slavism (which has been co-opted by right wing Russians) or whether a band without a Ukrainian member should be singing in the Ukrainian language like they're representative of Ukrainian views

The verdict: I honestly don't know how viewers are going to react without all the context - will it read as a feminist anthem? Maybe?

Best National Final reject: Rodan's Introvert Party Club or Pam Rabbit's Ghosting.

Who they are: A duo put together expressly for Eurovision

Jokes that have already been made:

Fun fact to sound like an expert: Reiley is 25 years old. And no, I don't know his skin care regime.

Jokes that have already been made:

Please, make more jokes about how Riley is a dead ringer for Chloe Grace Moretz

The verdict: It's cute and fun and not everything has to be for you, okay?

Best National Final reject: *whispers*

I skipped most of Denmark because they're such a happy nation they don't have the grit to make good music

Who they are: An Armenian singer-songwriter who can both croon and rap

What it's about: The dream of being in love vs. the reality of one's own hangups

The song: The first half is crooning and gentle; the second half is loud and angry. Somehow, it works!

FINALS NIGHT + BIG FIVE

The Eurovision Final will air on Saturday, May 13. The evening will consist of 26 acts. Twenty of them will be the top finishers from the semifinals. Five countries - France, Germany, Italy, Spain and the UK - get a free pass to the final because they contribute the most financially to the contest. And the winner of last year's contest - Ukraine - gets an automatic slot in the final.

In addition to the acts, there will be entertainment from:

- Last year's winners, Kalush Orchestra
- A panoply of Ukrainian Eurovision luminaries, including Go_A, Jamala, Tina Karol, and Verka Seduchka, who will perform during the opening flag parade
- Sam Ryder and his new single
- Former Eurovision artists - including Israel's Netta, Iceland's Dadi Freyr, Italy's Mahmood, Sweden's Cornelia Jacobs and Liverpool's own Sonia, the UK representative in 1993
- A surprise guest that is widely rumoured to be Sir Paul McCartney, although I'd love it more if it was Ringo Starr performing with Pinguini Tattici Nucleari (google that if you don't know what I'm talking about.)

The UK **can** vote here, and once again, I expect you to max out your coins for Austria and Belgium (fingers crossed they make it into the final.)
